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


Figure 2: Ordering codes and schemas.

1 Basic description

The EMU 3 is designed for remote monitoring of energy consumption. It is designed for installation on a DIN rail or mounting panel and does not have a local display. This concept is suitable for a wide range of applications in power engineering and smart networks, in building automation and individual production processes, for remote infrastructure supervision and also for automatic load management. The device is not equipped with local controls and therefore cannot easily interfere with the functions it performs — in simple terms, it should not attract the special attention of lay people in easily accessible places. To protect settings and collected data, the device can be locked with a pin or password. It uses the RS-485 communication line for connection to a superior system. The instrument measures three voltages. In addition, the local bus allows up to 5 EMI 12 devices to measure basic electrical parameters of up to 20 three-phase branches (60 currents).

1.1 Types and options

The EMU 3 is available in various configurations according to the customer's specifications¹. On figure 2 marking schema of all available options is drawn.

1.2 News in version 3.0

- four quadrant measurement of powers and energies, booth active and reactive
- extended, more accurate and continuous measurement of harmonic phasors (amplitudes and angles)
- possibility to synchronize device time from network frequency
- modular firmware modules for RCS/HDO
- Locking the device: new features for user access management have been added (see AppNote 0004).

1.3 Accessories

In table 1 is a list of accessories that are automatically delivered to each EMU 3 and accessories that can be specified when ordering or additionally purchased.

1.4 Measuring principles and signal processing

Connection and measurement

- DC supply voltage $10 \div 30 \,\mathrm{V}$
- three voltage inputs (L₁, L₂, L₃) for direct or indirect measurement of star or delta voltage, single-phase and Aron
 - measurement category III/300 V
- 6.4 kHz sampling, continuous measurement

2 Operating the measuring instrument

2.1 Safety requirements for use of the EMU 3



When working with the device, all necessary precautions must be taken to protect persons and property against injury and electric shock.

- The device must be operated by a person with the required qualifications for such operation and this person must be familiar with the principles of working with the device described in this description!
- If the unit is connected to parts that are under dangerous voltage, all necessary precautions should be taken to protect users and equipment from electric shock.
- The operator performing installation or maintenance of the equipment must be equipped with personal protective equipment and other safety equipment at work.
- If the device is used in a manner not specified by the manufacturer, the protection provided by the analyzer may be reduced.
- If the device or its accessories appear to be damaged or not working properly, do not use it and send it for repair.



2.2 Installing the device in a switchboard




Figure 3: Dimensions of EMU 3.

The EMU 3 is designed for mounting on a DIN rail. In the figure 3, the dimensions of the device are drawn. The hole positions for the wall mounting are dimensioned by a dashed line, which is screwed with two screws. The maximum cable cross-section for plug-in power and voltage measurement connectors is $2.5\,\mathrm{mm}^2$ and $1.5\,\mathrm{mm}^2$ for the RS-485 connector.

Natural air circulation should be allowed inside the switch gear at the installation site and its immediate surroundings. Do not install other equipment that could be a significant source of heat near to the instrument.

2.2.1 Auxiliary voltage



The device only has a low voltage power supply (option S) input. Caution should be taken when selecting a suitable power supply.




Figure 4: In a 300V/CAT III network it is necessary to use a power supply with the corresponding overvoltage category!

The instrument supply voltage must be connected to the terminals X1 and X2 via suitable fuses with appropriate characteristics for the respective environment (see diagram in figure 4 for power off). The disconnector must be located on the left side of the device within reach of the operator. The circuit breaker must be marked as a disconnect switch. A 0.5A circuit breaker is a suitable circuit breaker, but its location and function must be clearly identified (using the '0' and 'I' symbols according to EN 61010-1). The power supply galvanically separates the power terminals of the device from other internal circuits.

If the unit is operated with external EMI 12 modules connected, the power supply sizing must be adjusted accordingly. EMI 12 modules are powered by local bus from terminals $\rm X1$ and $\rm X2$ and will increase the total system consumption to a value exceeding the label parameters of the instrument EMU 3.

2.2.2 Measured voltages

Overvoltage category signals 300 V/CAT III can be directly connected to the voltage measurement inputs. The measured voltages are connected to terminals L1, L2 and L3. The center conductor connection terminal is marked N — not connected in a triangle or in Aron's wiring. All voltage measuring inputs are connected to the internal circuits via high impedance.

Measured voltages should be protected, for example, by a 0.5A fuse with a suitable tripping characteristic.




Figure 5: An example of a typical connection of EMU 3 when measuring many three-phase branches. The device is extended by 4 pieces of EMI 12 modules connected via local bus.

2.2.3 Local bus

The local bus uses the 8P8C connector to connect the external EMI 12 modules for current measurement on multiple branches. It is a proprietary bus combining signals for communication, synchronization and powering of external modules².



The physical layer of the local bus is not Ethernet compatible! Only EMI 12 modules can be connected to the device. Never connect the port labeled Local Bus to any Ethernet device, hub, etc. — they may be damaged!

The EMI 12 modules are equipped with two local bus connectors, allowing creation of a bus. An example of a connection is illustrated in the figure 5. EMU 3 allows the connection of up to five EMI 12 modules.

EMU 3 automatically detects module connections and performs their subsequent configuration. Measured variables are available in the current data immediately after connection and user configurations of newly detected modules can be done in the settings. To uniquely identify the modules in the settings, their serial numbers are used, which are printed on the label near the local bus connectors for ease of installation.

2.2.4 Connection of communication channel



The RS-485 interface is not galvanically isolated from the local bus and their reference potential corresponds to the negative supply voltage.




Figure 6: Connection of RS-485 communication lines to EMU 3 devices.

RS-485 It is usually used as an interface for remote reading of current values, archive records, and instrument settings. The RS-485 serial line uses the A +, B-, and G-signal terminals on the terminals described by RS-485 (fig. 6). The ends of the communication line must be terminated with the specified resistance.

For common use (cable length up to 100 m, communication speed up to 9600 Bd), the choice of cable type is not critical. It is possible to use virtually any shielded cable with two pairs of conductors and to connect the shield at one point to the PE conductor. If the cable length is over 100 m, or when the communication speed is higher (about 20 kbit/s), it is advisable to use a shielded communication cable with twisted pairs (so-called "twisted pair"), which has a defined wave impedance (usually about $100\,\Omega$). Signals A and B are connected by one pair, signal G by the other pair.

The RS-485 interface requires impedance termination of the end nodes using terminating resistors, especially at higher communication speeds and distances. Terminating resistors are only installed at the end points of the line (eg one at the PC and the other at the most remote device). They are connected between terminals A and B. A typical value of the terminating resistor is 120Ω .

Recommended type of conductor shielded twisted pair $2\times2\times0.2\,\mathrm{mm}^2$, e.g. Belden 9842 0,25 mm² Maximum conductor cross section: $1.5\,\mathrm{mm}^2$

2.3 Description of LED indicators

PWR green illuminates when supply voltage is present.

SYN blue flashes synchronously with the synchronization pulse every ten periods of the network frequency.

TX green flashes when sending data to the local bus.

RX red blinks when receiving data from the local bus.

2.4 Detailed instrument settings on the PC

It is advisable to set the EMU 3 instrument before starting the measurement. The settings can be made from the computer in the ENVIS³.

- 1. Turn the power on. Its presence will be indicated by the illuminated green PWR LED. If everything is OK, the instrument will go through the start phase and the SYN and TX LEDs will blink.
- 2. Connect EMU 3 to a computer via RS-485. The device is now ready for configuration.
- 3. Run the ENVIS.Daq application and select the COM communication interface type tab (Fig. 7).
- 4. Select the appropriate serial port, speed, address, and device type from the list.
 - (a) The default speed is $9600 \,\mathrm{Bd}$, which is also called service speed. It will always be possible to connect the device with a service speed even if you change the RS-485 speed in the device settings.
 - (b) The default address is 1. If the device address is forgotten, it is possible to use the Find on 232/485 function, which is part of the Locator window.
 - (c) Device type is KMB.




Figure 8: ENVIS.Daq application window with connected EMU 3 instrument.

- 5. Press *Connect* on menu or *ENTER*. The application attempts to connect to the specified device. If the connection is successful, it loads the settings stored in the device and displays a summary window (fig. 8).
- 6. Press the *Configs* button in the left column of the menu. A new window with device settings tabs appears.

The *Instrument Configuration* contains individual tabs with device parameters divided by meaning. User can change any parameters in individual tabs. Changes to settings are made only in the application and uploaded to the device by pressing the *Send* button. The *Receive* button can be used to retrieve the current valid settings from the device at any time. Bookmarks that have been changed locally and have not yet been written to the device are marked with a warning symbol . The *Save* and *Load* buttons are used to archive the current settings to or from a file.

In particular, the *Installation* and *Local Bus* tabs are essential for proper operation.


2.4.1 Installation (fig. 9a)

- Nominal frequency set according to the nominal frequency of the measured network (50 or 60Hz).
- Connection mode Sets how the device is connected either as a voltage measurement directly or via a voltage measuring transformer (usually a HV and VHV network).
- Connection type connection method in three-phase systems star connection. The connection options for the instrument are illustrated in Fig. 9 a 9c.
- U_{NOM} (nominal voltage) correct setting of U_{NOM} affects the relatively displayed voltage values and how the measurement is interpreted in ENVIS. We determine U_{NOM} according to the nominal voltage of the measured network.
- VT ratio if the *connection mode via VT* is selected, the conversion according to the used voltage transformers must also be set. The ratio you enter is:
 - Rated primary voltage: usual value is 22 000.
 - Nominal secondary voltage: usual value is 100 (other common 110, 120, 230 V, ...)
- Multiplier U this coefficient is rarely changed, but it can be used for corrections when measuring the voltage at the VT output with a non-standard ratio. The default is 1.


2.4.2 Local bus (fig. 10)


The window consists of five blocks:


(a) Setting of basic device connection parameters in ENVIS.Daq application.

- AVG Period allows you to set the averaging interval, the way to evaluate minima and maxima and to manually reset them.
- Slaves Modbus Address Block
 - Start Address sets the Modbus address at which data from the first measured terminal will be available. Additional branches are available on consecutive addresses.
- Configured Slaves Tree structure of set modules.
 - At the highest level, there are 5 positions for up to 5 EMI 12 modules with information displayed: Device Name, Device Type, Serial Number, Firmware Version.
 - Under each module there are 4 positions for each three-phase branch with information displayed: Branch Name, Connection Type, Inom, CT Ratio, Current Multiplier, Modbus Address (MA).
 - Under each branch there are 3 positions for each measurement channel with information displayed: Inverted, Input Channel, Assigned Voltage, Inom, CT Ratio and Multiplier (for 3*1Y connection).
- Detected but not Configured Slaves List of detected modules that are not yet set for measurement.
 - Each module here reports its type, serial number and firmware version.
 - Empty This slot is empty.
- Parameters Used to set individual tree items. The adjustable parameters vary according to the selected item (module/branch/channel) and also depend on the selected connection type.
 - Enabled Enables/disables the selected branch or channel. It is not possible to display measured data from deactivated branches/channels. Deactivate when the branch/channel is not used for measurement.
 - Name Sets the module, branch or channel name. It serves mainly for easier orientation in measured data.
 - Serial Number Used to pair the module in the tree with the detected EMI 12 module.
 - Clear Button to remove the pairing of the selected item with the set module.
 - Connection Selects the connection type of the selected branch. Three-phase connection types are available: star (3Y), triangle (3D) and Aron (3A). It is also possible to use the 3*1Y mode, which allows the measurement of three independent single-phase powers.
 - Inom Nominal current of selected branch (3Y, 3D or 3A) or channel (3*1Y).
 - Ratio The conversion ratio of current transformers on selected branch (3Y, 3D, or 3A) or channel (3*1Y).
 - Multiplier Current multiplier of the selected branch or channel serving, for example, to correct
 the measured value in case of sensitivity increase by passing multiple turns through the CT.
 Default value is 1 and has no effect.
 - Input Channel Allows software to correct wiring by assigning physical measurement channel CH1 through CH3 to logical channel CH1 through CH3. It is not set by default and the *Default* option is left.
 - Assigned Voltage With a 3*1Y connection, it allows you to select the reference voltage channel
 L1 through L3 for the selected channel CH1 through CH3, against which powers, phase shift, etc.
 is calculated. The *Default* option assigns CH1-L1, CH2-L2, and CH3-L3.
 - Inverted It allows software to correct the wrong connection of the selected channel. If the check box is checked, the polarity of the corresponding channel is inverted. The inversion is not performed by default and the field is not checked.




Figure 11: ENVIS.Daq — set date, time and time synchronization options in the device.

2.4.3 Date and time (fig. 11)

This tab contains settings related to the date and time on your device.

The *Instrument Time* panel displays the current date and time in the machine and the difference with the PC time. When you open the tab, it immediately loads the time from the device which is then updated regularly. Pressing the *Refresh* button will reload the current time from the device.

The Set Instrument Time panel offers elements for changing the time on your device.

- Set time from PC sets the time in the device according to the current time on the computer.
- Set user time sets the time in the device to the user-specified value.

Time settings panel — sets type of synchronization and how the device interprets and displays the time and date.

- Synchronization this parameter determines how the device synchronizes its time. Supported methods include:
 - None the device does not synchronize the internal clock. This is the default setting.
 - System frequency synchronization is performed by measuring the network frequency for a period of one month and defining the time deviation therefrom, if this value differs from the current time by more than 40 s, the time in the following measurement interval is adjusted.
- Time zone Time zone must be set according to local requirements. The setting is important for the correct interpretation of local time, which determines the current tariff zone allocation of the meter.
- Daylight Saving This parameter can be set to automatically switch local time according to the season (summer or winter time).




Figure 12: ENVIS.Daq — setting of communication line parameters.

2.4.4 Communication (fig. 12)

The device is always equipped with a RS-485 communication interface for parameterization and data download.

• Device Address — Assign a unique address to each device on one serial line.

COM

- Port speed baud-rate of a communication line. The default is 9600 Bd.
- Protocol select default settings for KMB or M-Bus.
- Parity even, odd or none.
- Data bits + parity specifies the number of data bits including parity bits. For 8 bit + parity, select 9. For 8 bit without parity, select 8.
- Stop Bits specifies the number of synchronization bits transmitted by the interface after each character sent.




Figure 13: ENVIS. Daq - configuration of programmable inputs and outputs behavior.

2.4.5 I/O Management (fig. 13)

EMU 3 is not equipped with any physical inputs and outputs. Therefore, only the internal states of the device are available in the I/O Management.

- As a digital signal entering the equation, it is possible to use the status of the instrument, exceeding the set limit of the measured quantity, comparing the time or an internal variable.
- The controlled output can be a function of sending a message via RS-485, a clock counter (available via Modbus) or a variable (also available via Modbus).

Modules (fig. 14) This special device settings tab is only used to activate and deactivate optional firmware modules by entering the correct activation code in the text field and sending it to the device. The activation status of each supported module is signaled.

2.5 Setting measurement identification

This setting is done in the main window of the ENVIS.Daq application. It is used to correctly identify and categorize measurement data while processing on a computer.

- Object Naming the measurement location. This is a text string value of up to 32 characters. With this identifier, records are stored in a database or file.
- Record Name Record naming helps to differentiate multiple measurements in one object (e.g. using the ID of the transformer to be measured). Again, this is a text string value of up to 32 characters. With this identifier, records are stored in a database or file.

To write the *Object* and *Record Name* to the instrument, press the *Send* button in the *Identify* panel. Other parameters displayed in this tab are only informational and cannot be changed. Displayed type of connected device (model, serial number, firmware version and hardware, etc.)

2.6 Transfer of measured data to PC

Connect the device to your computer and start ENVIS.Daq (fig. 7). Select the appropriate communication parameters (as described in 2.4) and connect to the device.

EMU 3 does not allow recording of archives and it is necessary to use the ENVIS.Online application or any application reading data via Modbus to transfer data to the PC.

However, using the *Act data* button it is possible to display all measured quantities from EMU 3 and from all branches, which can be switched by selection in the upper part of the window (see fig. 16).




Figure 15: ENVIS.Daq — identification.




Figure 16: ENVIS.Daq — Actual data window.

2.7 Display of electricity meter reading

EMU 3 has a built-in three-phase, four-quadrant electricity meter for all branches. The instrument separately registers the active imported EP+ and exported EP- energy. For reactive energy, it registers character — capacitive EQC and inductive EQL resp. capacitive EQC+, EQC- and inductive EQL+, EQL- especially in case of active energy import or export. Primarily it offers the sum values of all phases. For star-connection and single-phase connection, it also registers the values of all energy types in each individual phase.

Values can be recorded and processed in ENVIS or via the ModBus communication protocol in any other program.

4 Maintenance, service and warranty

Maintenance The instrument EMU 3 does not require any special maintenance. For reliable operation, it is only necessary to adhere to the specified operating conditions and not to expose it to rough handling and exposure to water or various chemicals that could cause damage.

The lithium battery installed in the instrument is capable of backing up memory and RTC for approximately 5 years without a power supply at an average temperature of 20° C and a typical load current in the instrument (< $10 \,\mu A$). If the battery is discharged, it is necessary to to send the instrument to the manufacturer for battery replacement.
